BE IT ORDAINED, by the City Council of the City of Fall River, as follows:

That Section 74-134 (b) of the Revised Ordinances of the City of Fall River, Massachusetts, 1999, which Section relates to Amount of User Charges, be amended, as follows:

Strike out "5,000 hundred cubic feet per year" and insert "2,000 hundred cubic feet per year, or 4,000 gallons per day".

DRAFT

BE IT ORDAINED, by the City Council of the City of Fall River, as follows:

That Chapter 74 of the Revised Ordinances of the City of Fall River, Massachusetts, 1999, which Chapter relates to Utilities be amended as follows:

SECTION 1.

That a new Section 74-134(c) be created and inserted in place as follows:

“(c)” Commercial and industrial accounts involved in food processing (such as ice production), where FDA or other applicable regulations mandate building drains in processing areas, where large volumes of water are used but minimal water is discharged to sewer (less than 25/gallons per/day), separate water meters may be approved by the Sewer Commission for use to disallow normal sewer user charges for said area.

A quarterly base fee shall be utilized as provided in the Fee Schedule in Appendix A.

SECTION 2.

That Appendix A – Fee Schedule for the Revised Ordinances of the City of Fall River, 1999, Chapter 74, be amended as follows:

That a new Section 74-134(5) be inserted as follows:

“(5)” Commercial and industrial accounts subject to Section 74-134(c) shall be charged \$500 per/quarter.

Dear Fall River City Council:

The Fall River Redevelopment Authority (FRRA) is in receipt of correspondence dated May 19, 2011 expressing the City Council's request for limited vehicular access to Old Second Street. At the FRRA's May 11, 2011 meeting, I read aloud a letter from Daniel Robillard outlining concerns of several Hudner Building residents. The FRRA discussed and considered the request for a short-term loading zone area and agreed that there was indeed a need for this provision. Prior to taking a formal vote on the matter however, the FRRA asked that legal counsel seek answers to a number of logistical questions regarding insurance liability and maintenance responsibility. FRRA's counsel is presently working to speak to the owners of both the Hudner and Academy Buildings and to seek answers to the questions raised. We expect that the FRRA will have this additional information and will further discuss this issue at the upcoming meeting on June 8, 2011. The FRRA will then quickly communicate any resolution to you.

WE ARE WRITING TO YOU FOR INFORMATION IN HOW WE WOULD GO ABOUT REQUESTING THE RECOGNITION OF AN OUTSTANDING CITIZEN OF OUR CITY.

THIS INDIVIDUAL, JACK HACKETT, HAS DEDICATED HIMSELF TO THE PRESERVATION OF ADULT SLOWPITCH SOFTBALL FOR 47 YEARS AND COUNTING AT FR. KELLY PARK. HE HAS BEEN RESPONSIBLE FOR THE INSTALLATION AND UPKEEP OF THE FENCES. UNDER JACK'S TIME AS DIRECTOR, WITH THE FALL RIVER PARK BOARDS PERMISSION, HE RAISED FUNDS TO ERECT AN 8 FOOT OUTFIELD FENCE (SOMERSET FENCE CO), HE PURCHASED AND ERECTED 2 ELECTRIC SCOREBOARDS, CEMENTED BOTH DUGOUTS SO PUDDLES WOULD NOT ACCOMULATE DURING INCLEMENT WEATHER, HAD THE SHED PAINTED AND WATERPROOFED, ERECTED A NEW FIREPROOF DOOR, HAD A FENCE ERECTED FOR STORAGE FOR FIELD EQUIPEMENT (TRACTOR, ETC). EVERY SEASON HE HAD LANDSCAPERS COME IN AND PREPARE THE INFIELD FOR THE SEASON (SPREADING CLAY AND ROLLING IT) AND PROVIDES A PORTER JOHN AT THE FIELD. IN 2010 HE HAD A NEW 8FT. OUTFIELD FENCE ERECTED (QUALITY FENCE CO) WITH A YELLOW FENCE GUARD. WITH THE PARK BOARD MEMBERS PERMISSION, HE IS LOOKING IN THE 2011 SEASON TO ERECT NEW SIDE FENCES (QUALITY FENCE CO) WITH YELLOW FENCE GUARD, AND HOPES TO PUT IN PLACE A FEW PICNIC BENCHES, MAKING THE PARK MORE FAMILY ORIENTED. THE LAST FEW SEASONS THE USE OF THE LIGHTS HAS FALLEN TO THE RESPONSIBILITY OF THE LEAGUE AND JACK HAS RAISED THE NECESSARY FUNDS TO ALLOW NIGHT PLAY. THE UPKEEP OF THE PLAYING CONDITIONS OF THE FIELD ARE ESSENTIAL FOR PLAYERS' SAFETY AND ENJOYMENT. JACK HAS ORGANIZED MANY LEAGUES DURING THOSE YEARS. THIS PAST YEAR ALONE HE HAD 48 TEAMS PLAYING AT FR. KELLY PARK.

SCHOLARSHIP CITY SOFTBALL LEAGUE, AN ADULT MENS LEAGUE WAS INTRODUCED IN 1963 AND SINCE THEN THE SATURDAY MORNING LEAGUE (1975-2008), THE SUNDAY MORNING LEAGUE (1970), THE SENIOR LEAGUE, PLAYERS OVER 40 YEARS OF AGE (1993 -2008), AND THE CO-ED LEAGUE (1995) HAVE ALL PLAYED AT FR. KELLY PARK. THE WOMENS FIRST EDITION JOINED THE FR. KELLY PARK FAMILY IN (2000).

JACK HAS SEEN PLAYERS GROW FROM YOUNG BASEBALL STARS TO MATURE SOFTBALL PLAYERS.

BESIDES BEING THE DIRECTOR OF SCSL, JACK IS ASSIGNER AND UMPIRE IN CHIEF OF THE MEN IN BLUE, THE ASA UMPIRE ASSOCIATION, WHO SERVICE NOT ONLY KELLY PARK BUT SURROUNDING AREA LEAGUES.

JACK RUNS USUALLY 3-4 TOURNAMENTS OVER THE SEASON AND PULLS IN TEAMS FROM TAUNTON, NEW BEDFORD, FAIRHAVEN, AND NEWPORT ALONG WITH SOMERSET, SWANSEA, DARTMOUTH, AND TIVERTON TO NAME A FEW LOCATIONS THAT COME TO OUR CITY. ALSO OVER THE YEARS HE ORGANIZED THE RAISING OF MONEY FOR THE EASTER SEAL SOCIETY SOFTBALL MARATHON WITH THE LATE BERT GOULET.

JACK , A RETIRED FALL RIVER TEACHER OF 43 YEARS, LOVES THE GAME AND ESPECIALLY HAS A FOND CONNECTION TO THE PARK. FROM PAINTING FENCES, TO BAILING OUT THE WATER TO GET THE PARK "READY FOR THE GAMES", TO THE UNIQUE RIGHT FIELD WITH ITS GENTLY HILL, IT HAS BECOME A TREASURED PART OF THIS LIFE.

WE WOULD LIKE TO REQUEST THAT THE SOFTBALL FIELD BE NAMED "THE JACK HACKETT FIELD" AT FR., KELLY PARK.

WHATEVER ASSISTANCE YOU CAN GIVE US WOULD BE GREATLY APPRECIATED. WE WOULD LIKE TO SEE HIM HONORED SO HE WOULD APPRECIATE THAT GREAT WORK AND DEDICATION



For Pete's sake

Jack Hackett has new summer role

The level of competition in the Scholarship City Softball League at Father Kelly Park may take a dip this summer without Jack Hackett between the lines.

Hackett, an affiliate for 22 years and the league's current president, has spent the previous 11 seasons as player-coach of the perennial powerhouse Nomads of the Class A ranks. But he's stepping down this season to play a different type of role.

The jocular school teacher in the Fall River School Department, who is also president of the ASA Southeastern Massachusetts Umpires Association, has been appointed

this area's Deputy Softball Commissioner, it was jointly announced by State Commissioner John Marchesi and Area Commissioner Joe Duarte.

So, instead of directing players, and being the envy of rival coaches and teams, Jack will be responsible for area qualifying tournaments in the Greater Fall River Area, which includes Somerset, Swansea and Westport.

Ironically, Jack's predecessor, Everett Cabral, is another familiar softball figure in these parts, and Jack couldn't say enough about Everett's efforts. "We in softball circles, are very grateful to Everett for the outstanding work he's done over the years," lauded Hackett.

Cabral became prominent in softball here through a different channel as a player. He was a star in the now defunct Greater Fall River Fastpitch League out of Kennedy Park.

It was a big decision for Jack, inasmuch as coaching has been somewhat of a way of life for him over the years. "I'm going to miss the intensity and the fierce competition that comes with the game, plus the comradeship I've had with so many great athletes and great guys."

However, Jack could very well have a change of heart soon into the 1985 season, because he plans on doing some umpiring this time around. "I really enjoy getting out there and being a part of it all," he explained.

Jack was a maker of champions. His teams over the years (Casey's, Mason's, Nile and Nomads) have gone to 14 state tournaments, and during that span, he garnered 845 victories against 324 defeats.

In rehashing his illustrious coaching career, Jack recalled a bevy of his former star players. The list reads like who's who in sports here in Fall River.

Names he mentioned were: Doug Carvalho, Ken Garant, Jay Machado, Frank Bigos, Frank Ferraz, Glenn Machado, Jack Driscoll, Tom Duclos, Rich Mello, Jim Swanson, Russ Boulay, the late Bob Turgeon, Jim Cook, Chuck Harrington, Ed Green, Steve Mercier, Steve Klex, Wayne Orton, Al Pinel.

Also, Ken DeCosta, Norm Josie Folster, Bob (his brother) Hackett, Joe Barboza, Tom Silvia, Tony Rego, Jim McMahon, Ken Medeiros, Bert Caton, Jeff Carvalho, Clayton Waite, Keith Cabral, Bob Depin, Bill Santos, Bob Viveiros, Steve Winarski, Steve Perreira, Paul Leite, Lionel Russo, John Guinen, Al Jordan, Moe Moniz, Buster Silva and Paul Cahill, Norm Bazinet, Art Pavao, John Reis and Buddy Dauphin.

JACK HACKETT, who is deserving of the title "Mr. Softball" throughout the Bristol County area, will be inducted into a precarious situation. Jack, president of the league, will serve as master of ceremonies at a time in which he will be honored.

Jack has been the embodiment of the league for almost three decades, both as a player and official. His past 12 years as president (still calling all the shots) has sustained the integrity and stability of the loop, not to mention the slew of prestigious tournaments that come here through his fervent efforts. He's been sort of an overachiever, to say the least.

But Jack is being inducted for his efforts between the lines, as well as his expertise as a manager. He's played on six championship teams (Rays, Caseys, Masons, Nile, Golden Dream and Nomads), as a rangy outfielder, and crafty pitcher.

In 1968, the flamboyant and straight forward Hackett managed to hurl a no-hitter (slowpitch). Only three other pitchers in the history of the league have done it. They are Al Mendes (Caseys), John Christo (CC's) and the most recent, Bob Dagwan (Astros) in 1985.

In his illustrious managerial career, Jack masterfully guided Nomads to an unbeaten 27-0 Division One record in '82. The only other team ever to muster an unbeaten record was the 1981 Spencers, which ironically featured Biggs and Galvin. Spencers had a 28-0 record.

Tournament-wise, Hackett-coached teams have represented Scholarship City League well. Hackett's '75 Nomads finished second in the state tourney, and in '82, was the third best in the Bay State.

Scholarship City is just one phase of Jack's overzealousness for area softball. He's been an ASA umpire for 15 years, officiating in girls scholastic games as well as collegiate and fast-pitch circuits. He is area ASA Deputy Commissioner and until this year, was president of the Southeastern ASA Umpires Association.

For Jack, a veteran educator in the Fall River School Department, softball hasn't been a hobby, it's been a fulltime proposition, and an act of love.



THE LEGENDARY JACK HACKETT

The Fall River Scholarship City Slowpitch League has begun its 30th season under the tutelage of legendary Jack Hackett. (That's him on the cover.)

In a city that has a deep and abiding sense of value for the past, Hackett will be remembered in the most admiring of terms - commitment.

With a natural aptitude for solving problems, there isn't a day of the year that goes by that Jack doesn't do some work concerning softball or umpiring. His annual softball task is to round-up teams, players, set schedules, find field maintenance crews, meet improvement expenses, find the time to run his operation efficiently to the satisfaction of 600-700 participants and pay all the rest of the bills.

While it is unique that he reads his ad-libs during his presentation speech at softball's annual awards banquet at the end of each season, it is also true that every word Jack says about sports and/or people in general, is taken very seriously. He is the incarnation of the Sports Bible of Softball.

Softball is a major recreation activity in Greater Fall River, a small thanks to Hackett. His ability to transcend the normal attitude about sports is his strongest attribute. To him, every player getting fair treatment, every team having a balanced schedule, every team's scoring, statistics and additional commentary has to be accurate, is the only way to run a league.

He oversees the SCSL, the Scholarship City Slowpitch League, Men's Senior Over 40 League, Co-Ed on Saturday and Sunday, and Easter Seals. In all there are about 35 teams signed up for this season.

Hackett hides from recognition for his work. The leagues, the players, after all, are the most important point in his sport. In fact, while being interviewed for this article he went out of his way to praise other directors, such as Joe Argo, Superintendent of the Somerset Men's League.

Operation costs must be managed and met. Teams that take part in league activities all must have sponsors - or pay their share of bills out of their pocket.

For 29 years, all-the-while adding new leagues or features and improving the ones already in operation, Hackett serving as league President, has found ways to meet expenses and then some. Officials have to be paid; ground work, fence and stand repair when performed by private contractors must be paid; there are awards, tournaments, ceremonies, the annual banquet and other stuff. Costing upwards of \$20,000 a year to run, this, my friends, is a big deal operation. He is most thankful to the administrations of Fall River city government that have done so much.

Hackett is the founder and President of the ASA and MIB, Men in Blue official's organization. He tends to setting standards, assigning officials and conducting training sessions. Jack lives in Fall River with his wife, Natalia. He's been a teacher for 37 years.



There was also a resolution filed on September 10, 1979 to name the tennis courts in honor of Gerard J. LePage.





**STATE BOARD SUSPENDS HAZARDOUS WASTE SITE CLEANUP
PROFESSIONAL'S LICENSE PENDING OUTCOME OF DISCIPLINARY
PROCEEDING**

BOSTON -- The Massachusetts Board of Registration of Hazardous Waste Site Cleanup Professionals (Board) has suspended the license of Theodore J. Kaegael, Jr., President of Kaegael Environmental, Inc., located in Fall River, pending the outcome of a disciplinary proceeding before the Board involving charges that Mr. Kaegael performed substandard work during the assessment and remediation of contaminated properties in Fall River, Weymouth, and Freetown.

The Board is an independent state licensing body that licenses private environmental professionals known as Licensed Site Professionals (LSPs). The Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) requires those who are legally responsible for cleaning up hazardous waste sites to hire an LSP to manage and/or oversee the required assessment and cleanup work.

The Board has instituted formal disciplinary proceedings against Mr. Kaegael after conducting an extensive investigation of a complaint filed by DEP alleging that Mr. Kaegael had not followed DEP's regulations during assessments and cleanups at a number of contaminated sites. DEP's regulations are designed to protect public health and the environment from the risks posed by such sites. As a result of that investigation, the Board determined that Mr. Kaegael failed to properly assess the full extent of contamination at four properties and did not sufficiently evaluate or eliminate the risks that the contamination presented to public health and the environment. Numerous serious violations were found at each site. The license suspension will remain in effect at least until the conclusion of the disciplinary proceeding, should Mr. Kaegael choose to file an appeal of the Board's determination.

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Among other things, the Board found that at two residential properties located at 254 Caroline Street and 261 Neptune Street in Fall River, Mr. Kaegael failed to properly evaluate whether indoor air at the residences had been affected by significantly high levels of chlorinated solvents (tetrachloroethene or PCE), vinyl chloride, and trichloroethene (TCE) detected in groundwater within 30 feet of the homes. Vinyl chloride is classified by the US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) as a carcinogen, while PCE and TCE are classified by EPA as probable carcinogens. When volatile solvents contaminate groundwater in close proximity to residences, it is essential to evaluate the possibility that hazardous vapors from these solvents have migrated to the air inside the residences, putting the residents at risk. The Board also found that Mr. Kaegael failed to determine the full extent of contamination at the two residential properties and submitted false and misleading information to his client concerning the risks posed by contamination at the properties, knowing that the information would be forwarded to Fall River officials for the purpose of obtaining Certificates of Occupancy for the two residences.

With respect to the site at 800 Bridge Street in Weymouth, which is now part of Abigail Adams Park, Mr. Kaegael asserted in a report submitted to DEP during 2000, and in notices to the public, that the high concentrations of lead and polychlorinated biphenyls (PCBs) at the site were properly isolated by soil and asphalt barriers constructed on the property. In fact, the soil and asphalt barriers were not placed on the property until two years later in 2002. Thus, during that intervening period the public was left vulnerable to potential exposure to high levels of lead and PCBs in soil in an area where public access was not restricted.

At the Freetown site, located at and around 3 Sammy's Lane in the village of Assonet, Mr. Kaegael failed to adequately determine the extent of groundwater contamination at a site where a number of private water-supply wells were contaminated with gasoline constituents, including benzene and MTBE. Although most, but not all, of the residential properties with private water-supply wells in the area were subsequently supplied with municipal water, Mr. Kaegael failed to obtain and record a required Grant of Environmental Restriction. The Grant of Environmental Restriction, which would be recorded on each residential deed, would put all future property owners on notice that a number of private water supply wells were contaminated with MTBE, benzene, and other gasoline constituents and should not be used. Mr. Kaegael also failed to evaluate how the installation of municipal water at some residences, and the nearly simultaneous shutdown of a contaminated groundwater treatment system, would impact contaminant migration in the groundwater towards other nearby wells at properties without public water.

Debra Stake, co-chair of the Board's Professional Conduct Committee stated: "This Suspension Order serves as a reminder to LSPs that they must comply with DEP's hazardous waste site cleanup regulations and the Board's standards of professional conduct or face severe disciplinary action. The violations here were serious -- a failure to adequately determine indoor air risks at residential properties, a failure to ensure that a soil and asphalt barrier was put in place to prevent exposure to soil contaminated with lead and PCBs on the site of a future public park, and a failure to adequately determine the extent of gasoline contamination in a residential neighborhood with a number of private water supply wells."

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The Board works to maintain high standards of practice by LSPs. It protects public health, welfare, and the environment by establishing qualifications for licensure, administering a licensing exam, requiring that LSPs obtain continuing education, and investigating complaints against LSPs to ensure compliance with state laws, regulations, and the Board's own rules of professional conduct. A state board has suspended the waste site cleanup license of the president of a Fall River environmental company for negligent oversight of four projects, including one at Abigail Adams Park in Weymouth.

Theodore Kaegael of Kaegael Environmental Inc. is appealing the board's ruling, which alleges that he falsely reported in 2000 that high concentrations of lead and polychlorinated biphenyls at the park were properly isolated with soil and asphalt barriers.

The Massachusetts Board of Registration of Hazardous Waste Site Cleanup Professionals said the barriers weren't installed until 2002.

"We didn't even own the property," Kaegael said, "â€¦"
